

Summary of testing requirements for travelers

02 September 2020

The information contained here is obtained from WHO country offices based on official government announcements and websites, or obtained from the IHR National Focal Point knowledge network.

Country	Testing requirements for travelers
Algeria	<p>For any traveler arriving in Algeria, it is not required to have a negative PCR of less than 72 hours. All travelers go through border health control, they will be confined in dedicated places except people aged 80 and over, people who were traveling for care who will be confined to their homes for 14 days.</p> <p>For those who are leaving Algeria, it depends on the country they want to go to. If required then travelers can do PCR according to country or company requirements prior to departure, otherwise they can leave without PCR.</p>
Angola	<p>The international Points of Entry are still closed. Officially the flights will resume on September 9</p> <p>The following requirements are in place for humanitarian flights: International travels (Arrivals and Departures) – RT-PCR test 72hrs before arrival/departure. For arrivals, 7 days of self-quarantine. PoE to Luanda Province are closed. Other Provinces people are circulating but must test first. Internal (local) travels – Serological tests (rapid tests) before 72hrs minimum before departure and self-quarantine upon arrival for 7 days. And If rapid test is IgM+, RT-PCR is performed.</p>
Benin	<p>Benin had never closed its airport since the start of the pandemic.</p> <p>The systematic screening test for travelers to and from Cotonou airport. The screening sites installed at the airport and at the Palais des Congrès, open 7 days a week, are intended to receive and process travelers' requests. With the National Laboratory for Viral Hemorrhagic Fevers, the only authorized laboratory has issued the results of these tests.</p> <p>Any traveler to Cotonou must</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Systematically carry out the screening test on arrival at Cotonou airport - Leave his passport at the border police and collect it at the latest, within 72 hours, with the result of his test - Pay the COVID-19 tax fees directly with the ticket with the airlines - Complete the online form with mention of a functional telephone number in Benin for calls, messaging - The costs to pay for the test: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • For the traveler on arrival at Cotonou airport: 100,000 FCFA giving the right to at least 2 tests, the first on arrival, a second test after 14 days for the one whose result is negative on the first test; • For the traveler departing from Cotonou airport: 50,000 FCFA for the ordinary service and 75,000 FCFA for the premium service giving right to a test. - In the event of a positive result, the traveler benefits from treatment and total free follow-up in accordance with the treatment protocol in force in Benin <p>The link to access the form to be completed is: https://centresurveillancesanitaire.com/</p> <p>Self-quarantine highly recommended for 14 days.</p>

Country	Testing requirements for travelers
Botswana	Borders are not opened for commercial flights. They will open for WFP Humanitarian flights on 22nd September 2020
Burkina Faso	<p>The airports were opened on August 1.</p> <p>Entry requirements: Negative PCR test result not older than five days; not show symptoms of COVID-19 at the time of travel; have not been in contact with a COVID-19 patient in the 14 days prior to travel Passenger showing neither symptoms suggesting COVID-19 nor temperature > 38 ° C and in possession of their negative PCR test result no later than five days during health formalities:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Counseling on respecting barrier gestures and distancing measures; - Community integration with recommendation of PCR test on D8 and D14 in dedicated sites <p>Passengers in transit without a document attesting to a negative PCR result on arrival</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Less than 48 hours on a scheduled flight: hotel confinement at their expense under police observation - More than 48 hours: completion of PCR and TDR under the same conditions as passengers at points of entry (90,000 FCFA); systematic confinement in a hotel at their expense while awaiting the results <p>Outgoing travelers (and depending on the requirements of the destination country) can take the test at identified laboratories and the tests are free. https://www.sante.gov.bf/fileadmin/user_upload/storages/information_sur_les_conditions_d_entree_au_bf_covid_19.pdf</p> <p>Land and rail borders are still closed to all traffic, except freight and humanitarian aid, since May 4, 2020 (except for exceptional authorizations)</p>
Burundi	As of 08/31/2020, Burundi's borders are not yet open to international commercial flights, only humanitarian flights land in Bujumbura. For Burundi, the PCR test is systematic for all those entering the country. The test for entries is not valid. We have to redo. For the output we require a PCR test of less than 72 hours.
Cameroon	<p>Flights resumed at Yaoundé Nsimalen International Airport on May 25, 2020 and June 15, 2020 at Douala International Airport.</p> <p>In Cameroon, the procedures for screening travelers are still being evaluated by the MINSANTE and the SGI COVID-19. However, the current strategy is focused on 02 plans: airports and land borders. For airports, on arrival travelers must present a negative PCR test dating back less than 72 hours at the place of initial boarding. For those in transit whose test validity has expired two RDTs (Ag and Ab) are performed. On departure, travelers must present a PCR test taken in an approved laboratory within 48 hours before boarding. For land borders, an Ag RDT is given to all travelers who do not show negative PCR test results. This is valid for both incoming and outgoing travelers. For internal travelers, there is no screening required but temperature control at transport agencies and airports.</p>
Cape Verde	Not yet open to international travel. However, there regular flights from and to Portugal, not for tourism, with some restrictions and the travelers should have the PCR test 72 hours before. The inter-islands flights are more regular and the condition to travel for some islands are the antibodies rapid test.

Country	Testing requirements for travelers
Comoros, Union of the	<p>On September 07, 2020 the international borders will be open.</p> <p>For the Union of the Comoros, only the PCR test is recommended on arrival. Results dating from less than 3 days.</p> <p>For any traveler arriving in the Comoros, he is required to have a negative PCR of less than 72 hours.</p> <p>For those leaving the Comoros, it depends on the country they want to go. If it is required then they can do it 72 hours before departure, otherwise they can leave without PCR.</p>
Congo, Republic of	<p>Date of reopening of international borders 08/24/2020</p> <p>Passengers with negative results for the COVID-19 RT-PCR test, dating from less than 72 hours, are not subject to the screening test on arrival and can continue with the formalities of entering Congo and observe 14 days quarantine.</p> <p>Passengers with negative COVID-19 RT-PCR results, older than 72 hours and less than 10 days, will be tested on arrival at the airport at their own expense, and then immediately released for the 14 days quarantine at home.</p> <p>Passengers who do not have COVID-19 RT-PCR test results or who have COVID-19 RT-PCR test results older than 10 days will be placed in quarantine at their own expense in hotels retained by the government, then results within 48 hours. The cost of the test is the responsibility of the traveler. In the event of a negative result, the passenger is released for the rest of the quarantine at home; in the event of a positive result, the passenger is transferred immediately to one of the case management sites.</p> <p>Passengers in transit are isolated at their expense in the hotels designated for this purpose until the continuation of their journey outside the national territory.</p> <p>Children <11 years old are exempt from all these provisions</p> <p>All travelers leaving the Congo are required to perform a COVID-19 RT-PCR test within the time limits required by the country of destination. Test results can be retrieved online: www.insp-cg.org . The cost of the test is 20,000 FCFA and will be subject to regular reviews. Children <11 years old are exempt from all these provisions, unless otherwise specified by the country of destination.</p>
Côte d'Ivoire	<p>July 1, 2020: opening of air borders, and resumption of international flights (suspended for three months). June 26, 2020: Resumption of domestic flights. Land borders still closed.</p> <p>On departure, travelers must undergo screening for the COVID-19 disease in the approved and dedicated centers for the testing and carry out a PCR costing 50,000 FCFA payable online on the site www.deplacement-aerien.gouv.ci</p> <p>On arrival, any traveler must justify the absence of COVID-19 infection by presenting a negative PCR test certificate dating less than 05 days by an approved laboratory on the national plan or a serological test indicating a past infection with COVID-19.</p> <p>Any passenger without such a certificate of a serological test indicating an old infection, will be placed in isolation for 14 days at the expense of the airline.</p>
Eritrea	<p>All borders and airports officially are closed but for some essential International staff and Diplomats is open via WFP flight.</p> <p>Entry visa must be processed and approved before arrival. 14 days quarantine is mandatory either self-quarantine at home (not shared) / Asmara Palace Hotel. Movement and contact with people are not allowed while in quarantine days. After 14 days of quarantine RT-PCR test done if negative the individual will be released from the quarantine. Any test done outside the country is not valid.</p>

Country	Testing requirements for travelers
Eswatini	<p>Seven out of 13 ground crossings never closed for international travelers. Travelers can travel by air to OR Tambo in South Africa and connect by road to Eswatini. The airport however still closed. Its only open for humanitarian flights.</p> <p>There is no mandatory testing before travelling. No test is required for those arriving to the country. However, travelers are put on mandatory quarantine for 14 days on arrival either self-quarantine or institutional in hotels funded by Government. In quarantine they are monitored for symptoms. If anyone develops symptoms, then PCR test is done. If no symptoms a rapid test is done before discharge at day 14.</p>
Ethiopia	<p>International flights never suspended.</p> <p>Testing is not mandatory but is highly recommended. Actions taken depend on test certificate available yes/no and civilian/diplomatic status: Passengers arriving without COVID test results from tests taken in the past 5 days:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Civilian: 7 days mandatory quarantine in a designated hotel (at expense of traveler), followed by 7 days home quarantine. Test is taken at the hotel during the first seven days after arrival • Diplomat (Embassy, UN, African Union with LP/Diplomatic passport): 14 days home quarantine, no further testing is done <p>Passengers arriving with negative COVID PCR test certificate, with sample collected within 5 days prior to arrival</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Second test is taken upon arrival at Bole Airport (optional for diplomats, but encouraged) • Passenger can travel home for 14 days home-quarantine <p>Travelers departing from Ethiopia: No requirements from Ethiopia side, screening is done at point of departure by airline, in line with requirements for arrival country. Gabon	<p>Air borders only are reopened on July 7</p> <p>In Gabon the PCR test is the only test required. All travelers from abroad are collected at the airport with results obtained within 48 hours. Travel to the interior of the country is conditioned by a negative result to SARS-COV2 dating less than 5 days Asymptomatic cases are followed at home with precise instructions, continuous follow-up is ensured and if symptoms persist, hospitalized in a dedicated facility.</p> <p>Subject to reciprocity of the country of origin, are only authorized to embark at the airports of Gabon and to disembark there, the passengers of the commercial flights presenting the proof of their negativity to RT-PCR test of the COVID-19, carried out 5 days at the most before the date of embarkation or disembarkation by a center approved by the WHO. Passengers arriving in Gabon must remain in the city where the disembarkation airport is located for at least 14 days and undergo self-isolation for the same period.</p>
Gambia	<p>The Gambia has still not opened its borders due to a surge in COVID-19 cases. Currently, only humanitarian and repatriation for Gambian flights allowed.</p>

Country	Testing requirements for travelers
Ghana	<p>Ghana's borders are officially closed. Exception has been made for evacuated Ghanaians or those stranded abroad, humanitarian workers and diplomats returning through the airport. Information below is subject to change as the country anticipates opening the airport officially in September.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Evacuated Passengers <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ For now, it has not been made mandatory for evacuated travelers to have a negative test. ○ Travelers will have to undergo a mandatory 14-day quarantine and will be discharged from quarantine after being declared COVID-19 negative at the end of the period. Quarantine will be at the cost of the traveler or their organization. ○ Appropriate samples will be taken from travelers during the quarantine period for COVID-19 testing. ○ The samples will be taken as soon as possible once travelers settle into quarantine and again at the end of the 14-day quarantine period if the initial test is negative. ○ Those testing positive at any point will be transported to a designated treatment centre for further management. ○ Passengers who remain negative at the end of the quarantine period will be discharged from quarantine upon receipt of their laboratory results. • Diplomats returning to Ghana: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Negative COVID test conducted between 2 weeks to 5 days before arrival ○ Mandatory self-quarantine on arrival at residence ○ Repeat COVID test within the 14 days of quarantine <p>There is no official position for those travelling outside the country as at now with the borders closed.</p>
Guinea	<p>July 17, 2020: opening of air borders, and resumption of international flights</p> <p>On departure, the traveler must be tested 3 days before the trip; appointments for the test can be made on the site www.insp-guinee.org . The results are returned 48 hours later with the issuance of a results booklet. The test for travelers costs 650,000 GNF.</p> <p>On arrival travelers must demonstrate their negative COVID-19 test status. It is the responsibility of airport authorities and airlines to ensure that passengers hold a certificate when boarding.</p>
Guinea Bissau	<p>International commercial flights resumed July 25.</p> <p>Present a negative PCR-RT Test Certificate for COVID-19, issued by an accredited laboratory, obtained up to 72 hours before the start of the trip</p> <p>Passengers who present fever or other symptoms suggestive of COVID-19, will be immediately directed to a dedicated and private space, where they will be subjected to a second health screening, being subject, if the situation warrants, to a test by COVID- 19, after which they may leave the border post. These passengers must remain obligatorily confined to their destinations of residence until they receive the results of the test carried out and additional instructions from the health authorities.</p> <p>All passages on a flight in which a passenger suspected of COVID-19 has been detected will be quarantined at home and monitored by the health authorities for a period of 14 days.</p> <p>For the departure, the modalities depend on the country of destination.</p>

Country	Testing requirements for travelers
Equatorial Guinea	<p>International commercial flights resumed on July 15.</p> <p>A negative PCR test is required on arrival, not older than 48 hours If the passenger does not have this negative test, the sample is taken at the airport and passenger quarantined at a hotel in the city, until the test result is available; usually within 48 hours. The cost of the quarantine (cost of the hotel) is paid by the passenger The cost of the test is 50,000 for nationals and 110,000 XAF for foreigners (PCR not requested)</p> <p>To leave the country, the passenger can take the test by paying the same cost, if the destination country requires it.</p>
Kenya	<p>International Air Travel resumed on 1st August 2020</p> <p>All arriving passengers on international flights with a COVID-19 Negative certificate whose body temperature is NOT above 37.5° C (99.5°F), do NOT have a persistent cough, difficulty in breathing or other flu-like symptoms, and have negative tests carried out within the 96 hours before travel shall be exempt from quarantine. Passengers without symptoms can proceed to their residences but after signing onto an e-platform (called Jitenge) that reminds the traveler to update on any symptoms for 14 days. Passengers arriving on flights after the curfew, with a valid Air Ticket and Boarding Pass shall be allowed to proceed to their hotels and/or residences.</p> <p>For those passengers traveling out of the country, they will be required to abide by the travel, health and COVID-19 related requirements of the destination country. Passengers departing on flights after the curfew, with a valid Air Ticket and Boarding Pass shall be allowed to proceed to their departure airport.</p>
Lesotho	<p>International flights to and from Lesotho have not yet resumed.</p> <p>Rapid testing of all commercial cargo vehicle drivers and all those who cross into the country at ports of entry. Only negative foreign drivers and other persons shall be allowed entry. Positive foreign drivers and persons shall be denied entry. Positive Lesotho citizens shall be quarantined for PCR testing.</p>
Liberia	<p>In Liberia, the testing strategy involves testing outgoing and incoming passengers or travelers. The testing platform is PCR! If an incoming traveler presents a valid negative test result done within 48-72 hours before travel to Liberia, they allow them in without repeating the test, but will be monitored. All passengers leaving the country are tested and given a negative result certificate signed by the Hon. Minister of Health, the Chief Medical Officer, and the Director General of the National Public Health Institute before departure</p>
Madagascar	<p>International borders will be open on October 1, 2020.</p> <p>For any arrival in Madagascar, presentation of a negative PCR test for COVID-19 or a certificate of non-contagiousness less than 72 hours before departure - Submit to a 2nd PCR test on D10 after arrival.</p> <p>For any departure from Madagascar, arrangements are made according to the requirements of the country of destination.</p>
Malawi	<p>Opening-up date for international travel: 1st September 2020. Only a limited number of flights will be allowed and the only airport that is going to be opened is Kamuzu International Airport in Lilongwe.</p> <p>All arriving passengers will be required to have a negative SARS Cov-2 PCR test certificate obtained within 10 days prior to arrival in Malawi. Arriving passengers may be required to provide samples for COVID-19 testing.</p>

Country	Testing requirements for travelers
	<p>Results will be available within 48hrs. All arriving passengers will be required to proceed to self-quarantine for 14 days.</p> <p>All travelers originating from Malawi shall also be required to hold a negative SARS Cov-2 PCR test.</p>
Mali	<p>The air borders have been open since July 25; land borders since July 31.</p> <p>Passage arriving in Mali must comply with the following requirements:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Complete the online health declaration form on the following sites: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> o www.sante.gov.ml o www.anac-mali.org - Submit a negative COVID-19 RT-PCR test certificate not older than 7 days - Otherwise, be tested for COVID-19 at the airport and must comply with the following health control measures, pending the result of the test: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> o Self-quarantine at home or at the hotel at their expense o Respect the barrier measures in all circumstances o In the event of a positive result, the passenger will be transferred to a treatment facility - Notwithstanding the presentation of the negative certificate, in the presence of a symptom of COVID-19, traveler will be isolated and subjected to the screening test - The passenger in transit must comply with the following prescriptions: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Submit a negative COVID-19 RT-PCR test certificate not older than 7 days - If the transit or correspondence requires accommodation in a hotel, confine yourself there and respect the barrier measures until the moment of leaving the territory
Mauritania	<p><u>Concerning air transport</u> Commercial flights are not yet officially open.</p> <p>The current air transport arrangements concern the return of nationals, the departure of foreigners and other travelers from official missions and international organizations. For departing passengers, there is a requirement for airlines to screen for SARS CoV2 by RT-PCR 48 hours before departure. For arriving passengers, it is recommended to have a PCR test of less than 48. If the passenger has not carried out the PCR test, the airline company is obliged to repatriate the person to place of origin, except for Mauritanian passengers, where a rapid antibody detection test (IgG / IgM) is carried out on arrival by a medical team based at the airport and the passenger is placed in isolation while awaiting the results of the test.</p> <p><u>Regarding ground crossings</u> At land entry points, the temperature is taken systematically, and rapid antibody detection tests are carried out if necessary.</p> <p>Ongoing reflections The Ministry of Health is finalizing the new screening strategy which will be based on the decentralization of the PCR platform at the level of certain health structures in Nouakchott and the interior and complemented with rapid tests for the detection of antibodies. To date, all tests carried out for travelers are free. A reflection on the recovery of tests (pricing) is underway at the Ministry of Health.</p>

Country	Testing requirements for travelers
Mauritius	<p>Not yet open for commercial flights. Still in Phase 1: International flights to repatriate stranded citizens and foreigners stranded in Mauritius.</p> <p>All incoming travelers are required to have a valid COVID Test (PCR) 5 days prior to departure. Currently all incoming travelers are quarantined for 14 days – in quarantine a PCR test is done on arrival (Day 0) and on Day 7 and Day 14</p> <p>All persons travelling abroad will have to undertake a COVID Test as required by the country of destination. In the same vein, the validity of the test depends on the country of destinations requirements.</p>
Mozambique	<p>The air space still not yet opened international commercial flights but. Now it is only operating the repatriation and humanitarian flights.</p> <p>All passengers arriving in the country</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Must present a certificate of a Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) test with a negative result for SARS-CoV-2, carried out in the country of origin in the last 72 hours before departure. • Are subject to the mandatory 10-day consecutive home quarantine regime. • Must perform a new Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) test with negative results for SARS-CoV-2 at the end of the quarantine period, with the testing costs being borne by the owners themselves. <p>There is not any focus on outbound travelers. Private labs are however conducting testing of outgoing travelers upon their own request.</p>
Namibia	<p>Namibia is open to international commercial flights since the 1st of September 2020.</p> <p>Travelers arriving Namibia, the length of quarantine is 7 days in approved facilities or self-quarantine. Travelers are expected to arrive with a negative PCR-based results not older than 7 days. They will be tested on day 7 and may leave quarantine on receipt of negative PCR result. If positive, then isolation. Tourists are required to remain at their first destination for 7 days. They must arrive with a 72-hour negative PCR-based test and will be tested after 3 days of arrival in Namibia. They will be allowed to proceed with their itinerary on negative PCR.</p>
Niger	<p>Niger opened its borders for international commercial flights on August 01, 2020.</p> <p>In Niger, PCR testing less than 72 hours old is required. If the report or the test certificate negative for COVID-19 is invalid (date of result more than 72 hours at the start of the trip; unauthorized test laboratory) the traveler is subjected to a PCR test at their expense. In this case, the traveler is isolated at home or at place of residence while awaiting the result. If the traveler has symptoms reminiscent of COVID-19 he is subjected to a PCR test free of charge. If the test is negative, the traveler is placed in self-isolation at home. If the test is positive, the traveler is transferred to a dedicated care center.</p> <p>For short-stay travelers (mission, internship, etc.) they are not subject to self-isolation but receive advice on how to comply with barrier measures. They take the PCR test for COVID-19 again at their own expense. No more 14 days of confinement at the hotel; self-containment at home for 14 days with respect of barrier measures.</p> <p>Anyone leaving the country should have a negative PCR test for COVID-19 less than 72 hours. In case of postponement of the trip invalidating the test, the traveler must retake the test at his own expense. The departing traveler with suspicious signs of COVID-19 is taken to the screening station for a rapid test without charge.</p> <p>PCR tests carried out from Niger are chargeable (30,000 FCFA) except for beneficiaries of medical evacuations.</p>

Country	Testing requirements for travelers
Nigeria	<p>International borders to reopen September 5th.</p> <p>All intending travelers to Nigeria must have tested NEGATIVE for COVID-19 by PCR in country of departure pre-boarding. The PCR test MUST be within 7 days before departure and preferably within 72 hours pre-boarding. For certain countries, COVID-19 PCR tests will only be acceptable from specified laboratories. All travelers are required, on arrival at the airport, to go through the routine Port Health screening and present electronic or print-out evidence of pre-boarding PCR test results and evidence of payment / appointment for a repeat PCR test in-country. Passengers are required to present their international passports for clearance; the biodata page including passengers' picture will be forwarded to all COVID-19 PCR Sample Collection Centers to enable proper identification before sample collection. Passports will not be retained by the Nigerian Immigration Service.</p> <p>To travel out, at least 72hrs is needed for sample collection and test result, this will be dependent on the country of arrival.</p> <p>Attaching the guidance and relevant website: https://covid19.ncdc.gov.ng/advisory/</p>
CAR	<p>The effective reopening was July 13, 2020</p> <p>In the CAR, there is no requirement for COVID-19 testing on arrival. However, a review of the guidelines is underway for the review of quarantine duration and passenger requirements. However, quarantine is required in home self-containment upon arrival in the country.</p>
RDC	<p>For the DRC, the PCR test is recommended on departure and on arrival. But the official document has not yet been released.</p>
Rwanda	<p>Rwanda airports, including Kigali International Airport (KGL), were reopen for commercial flights from 1st August 2020.</p> <p>ARRIVAL All travelers arriving in Rwanda must have a negative COVID-19 certificate. The only accepted test is a SARS-CoV 2 Real Time Polymerase Chain Reaction (RT-PCR) performed within 120 hours of departure (meaning travelers must be tested and get results within 5 days of their first flight). Other tests, such as Rapid Diagnostics Test (RDTs), are not accepted. Please see passenger locator form and list of designated transit hotels on www.rbc.gov.rw.</p> <p>All travelers arriving or transiting through Rwanda will be screened upon entry and take a second RT-PCR test to confirm the negative results of the test done prior to arrival.</p> <p>All travelers are required to wait 24 hours for the results of their COVID-19 test in a designated transit hotel.</p> <p>DEPARTURE All travelers departing from Rwanda must test negative for COVID-19. The only accepted test is a SARS-CoV 2 Real Time Polymerase Chain Reaction (RT-PCR) performed within 120 hours before departure. Other tests, such as Rapid Diagnostics Test (RDTs), are not accepted. We encourage travelers to book and pay for their tests at least 2 days prior to departure through the online platform available on www.rbc.gov.rw</p> <p>Travelers from neighboring countries planning to start their international travel from Rwanda will be screened at points of entry and taken to transit hotels where samples will be taken for a COVID-19 test.</p>

Country	Testing requirements for travelers
	<p>They are requested to arrive at designated transit hotels at least 48 hours before departure where they will await their test results.
